Below are some do and don'ts to look for when you a

Do:

- 3/4 Research and investigatery potential employer
- $^{3}\!\!\!/_{\!\!\!4}$ Be aware if $\dot{a}\!\!\!\!/$ ob is offering dot of money for minimal work
- 3/4 If possible set up a faceo-face interview or visit the location of the employer
- 3/4 Check the Better Business Bureau for complaints against the company
- 3/4 Do a Google search of the company or organizatiea the reviews
- 3/4 Create an account with Indeed, CareerBuilder, LinkedIn, etc.
- 3/4 Check to make sure email addresses match the company

Don'ts:

- 3/4 Don't open or apply for random jobs that come to your emailways verify the source
- 3/4 Don't accept any money up front before you start or do any work
- 3/4 Don't give out any personal information such as banking or credit or debit information
- 3/4 Don't apply for a job that doesn't clearly indicate the name of the company
- 3/4 Don't give any money up front upon accepting a job
- 3/4 Don't take cashier's checks or money orders as a form of payment
- 3/4 Never cash checks that come with "extra" money

These are common job scams that target college students:

- 3/4 Pyramid schemesoften sales
- 3/4 Mystery shoppers
- 3/4 Envelope stuffing from home
- 3/4 Personal Assistants

Remember:

- 3/4 Scammers often send emails with grammatical errors and typos. Beware of emails offering to hire you without ever meeting you in person.
- 3/4 Remember never send money (gift cards, cash, checks or wire) to someone you do not know
